A BILL

- To require a strategy for bolstering engagement and cooperation between the United States, Australia, India, and Japan and to seek to establish a Quad Inter-Parliamentary Working Group to facilitate closer cooperation on shared interests and values.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Strengthening the5 Quad Act".

1 SEC. 2. SENSE OF CONGRESS.

2 It is the sense of Congress that—

3 (1) as a Pacific power, the United States should 4 continue to strengthen joint cooperation between the 5 United States, Australia, India, and Japan (com-6 monly referred to as the "Quadrilateral Dialogue" or 7 "Quad" and referred to as such in this Act) to en-8 hance and implement a shared vision to meet re-9 gional challenges and to promote a free, open, inclu-10 sive, resilient, and healthy Indo-Pacific, that is char-11 acterized by respect for democratic norms, rule of 12 law, and market-driven economic growth, and is free 13 from undue influence and coercion;

(2) the United States should expand dialogue
and cooperation through the Quad with a range of
partners to support peace and prosperity, the rule of
law, freedom of navigation and overflight, the peaceful resolution of disputes, and democratic resilience
in the Indo-Pacific;

(3) the pledge from the first-ever Quad leaders
meeting on March 12, 2021, to address shared challenges, including in public health, cyberspace, critical
technologies, counterterrorism, quality infrastructure
investment, and humanitarian assistance and disaster relief, as well as maritime domains, laid the

foundation for critical cooperation among Quad
 countries;

(4) the Quad countries, working through insti-3 4 tutions, including the United States International 5 Development Finance Corporation, the Japan Inter-6 national Cooperation Agency, and the Japan Bank for International Cooperation, and through partner-7 8 ships with multilateral development banks such as 9 the World Bank and the Asian Development Bank, 10 development and infrastructure should finance 11 projects in the Indo-Pacific region that are competi-12 tive, transparent, and sustainable;

(5) President Biden's decision to elevate the
Quad to the leader level was critical to bolstering cooperation, and all 4 countries should work to ensure
that the Quad Leaders' Summit continues to take
place regularly;

(6) the ambitious framework for ongoing cooperation laid out by the 4 leaders at the fifth convening of the Quad Leaders' Summit in Hiroshima
on May 20, 2023, should continue;

(7) Secretary of State Marco Rubio hosted the
Quad Foreign Ministers in Washington D.C. on January 21, 2025—his first day in office—underscoring

1	the continued importance of cooperation between the
2	4 democracies; and
3	(8) the formation of a Quad Inter-Parliamen-
4	tary Working Group will—
5	(A) sustain and deepen engagement be-
6	tween senior officials of the Quad countries on
7	a full spectrum of issues; and
8	(B) be modeled on the successful and long-
9	standing bilateral inter-parliamentary groups
10	between the United States and Mexico, Canada,
11	and the United Kingdom, as well as other for-
12	mal and informal parliamentary exchanges.
13	SEC. 3. STRATEGY.
14	(a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days after the
15	date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of State
16	shall submit to the appropriate congressional committees
17	a strategy for bolstering engagement and cooperation with
18	the Quad.
19	(b) MATTERS TO BE INCLUDED.—The strategy re-
20	quired by subsection (a) shall include the following:
21	(1) A description of how the United States in-
22	tends to demonstrate democratic leadership in the
23	Indo-Pacific through quadrilateral engagement with
24	Australia, India, and Japan on shared interests and
25	common challenges.

(2) A summary of—

2 (A) current and past Quad initiatives 3 across the whole of the United States Govern-4 ment, including to promote broad based and in-5 clusive economic growth and investment, and to 6 advance technology cooperation, energy innova-7 tion, climate mitigation and adaptation, phys-8 ical and digital infrastructure development, edu-9 cation, disaster management, resilient supply 10 chains including in critical minerals, and global 11 health security;

(B) proposals agreed to by all Quad countries since January 2021 to deepen existing security cooperation, intelligence sharing, economic partnerships, and multilateral coordination; and

17 (C) initiatives and agreements undertaken
18 jointly with Quad countries, in addition to other
19 like-minded partners in the Indo-Pacific, on
20 areas of shared interest since January 2021.

(3) A description of the diplomatic and bureaucratic barriers and obstacles to implementing and
expanding existing streams of Quad cooperation.

1	(4) A list of recommendations on how Congress
2	could assist in addressing the barriers described in
3	paragraph (3), as well as—
4	(A) any new authorities needed to
5	strengthen United States leadership in and con-
6	tribution to existing and proposed Quad initia-
7	tives and programs; and
8	(B) additional resources needed to scale up
9	and expand successful Quad initiatives and pro-
10	grams.
11	(c) Appropriate Congressional Committees De-
12	FINED.—In this section, the term "appropriate congres-
13	sional committees" means—
14	(1) the Committee on Foreign Affairs of the
15	House of Representatives; and
16	(2) the Committee on Foreign Relations of the
17	Senate.
18	SEC. 4. ESTABLISHMENT OF QUAD INTER-PARLIAMENTARY
19	WORKING GROUP.
20	(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—Not later than 60 days after
21	the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of
22	State shall seek to enter into negotiations with the Gov-
23	ernments of Australia, India, and Japan (collectively, with
24	the United States, known as the "Quad") with the goal
25	of reaching a written agreement to establish a Quad Inter-

Parliamentary Working Group to facilitate closer coopera tion on shared interests and values.

3 (b) UNITED STATES GROUP.—

4 (1) IN GENERAL.—At such time as the govern5 ments of the Quad countries enter into a written
6 agreement described in subsection (a) to establish a
7 Quad Inter-Parliamentary Working Group, there
8 shall be established a United States Group, which
9 shall represent the United States at the Quad Inter10 Parliamentary Working Group.

11 (2) MEMBERSHIP.—

12 (A) IN GENERAL.—The United States
13 Group shall be comprised of not more than 24
14 Members of Congress.

(B) APPOINTMENT.—Of the Members of
Congress appointed to the United States Group
under subparagraph (A)—

(i) half shall be appointed by the
Speaker of the House of Representatives,
based on recommendations from the minority leader, from among Members of the
House, not fewer than 4 of whom shall be
members of the Committee on Foreign Affairs; and

1	(ii) half shall be appointed by the
2	President Pro Tempore of the Senate,
3	based on recommendations of the majority
4	leader and minority leader of the Senate,
5	from among Members of the Senate, not
6	fewer than 4 of whom shall be members of
7	the Committee on Foreign Relations (un-
8	less the majority leader and minority lead-
9	er determine otherwise).
10	(3) Meetings.—
11	(A) IN GENERAL.—The United States
12	Group shall seek to meet not less frequently
13	than annually with representatives and appro-
14	priate staff of the legislatures of Australia,
15	India, and Japan, and any other country in-
16	vited by mutual agreement of the Quad coun-
17	tries.
18	(B) LIMITATION.—A meeting described in
19	subparagraph (A) may be held—
20	(i) in the United States;
21	(ii) in another Quad country during
22	periods when Congress is not in session; or
23	(iii) virtually.
24	(4) Chairperson and vice chairperson.—

1	(A) HOUSE DELEGATION.—The Speaker of
2	the House of Representatives shall designate
3	the chairperson or vice chairperson of the dele-
4	gation of the United States Group from the
5	House from among members of the Committee
6	on Foreign Affairs.
7	(B) SENATE DELEGATION.—The President
8	Pro Tempore of the Senate shall designate the
9	chairperson or vice chairperson of the delega-
10	tion of the United States Group from the Sen-
11	ate from among members of the Committee on
12	Foreign Relations.
13	(5) PRIVATE SOURCES.—The United States
14	Group may accept gifts or donations of services or
15	property, subject to the review and approval, as ap-
16	propriate, of the Committee on Ethics of the House
17	of Representatives and the Committee on Ethics of
18	the Senate.
19	(6) CERTIFICATION OF EXPENDITURES.—The
20	certificate of the chairperson of the delegation from
21	the House of Representatives or the delegation of
22	the Senate of the United States Group shall be final
23	and conclusive upon the accounting officers in the
24	auditing of the accounts of the United States Group.

REPORT.—The United States 1 (7)ANNUAL 2 Group shall submit to the Committee on Foreign Af-3 fairs of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Foreign Relations of the Senate a report 4 5 at the end of each year that outlines the group's activities that year, including a description of its ex-6 7 penditures, and its recommendations for enhancing 8 the Quad.

9 (8) ENGAGEMENT WITH U.S. OFFICIALS ON THE
10 QUAD.—Senior United States officials shall provide
11 regular updates and briefings to the United States
12 Group, including leading up to and after major
13 Quadrilateral dialogues, to ensure close coordination
14 with Congress.
