6 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.

8	(1) The term "appropriate congressional com-
9	mittees" means—
10	(A) the Committee on Foreign Affairs and
11	the Committee on Appropriations of the House

13	(B) the Committee on Foreign Relations

2	cation" means that girls and boys have equal access

4	the definition of "gender parity in basic education"

7	(3) The term "USAID" means the United
8	States Agency for International Development.
9	SEC. 3. SENSE OF CONGRESS.
10	It is the sense of Congress that—
11	(1) every child, regardless of gender or place of
12	birth, deserves an equal opportunity to access qual-
13	ity education;
14	(2) education is a key investment in the future,
15	well-being, and prosperity of girls, as well as the sta-
16	bility and productivity of their communities;
17	(3) the United States has been a global leader
18	in efforts to expand and improve access to quality
19	basic education for all, particularly marginalized and
20	vulnerable populations, including women and girls;
21	(4) gains with respect to girls' secondary edu-
22	cation and empowerment have been proven to cor-
23	relate strongly with efforts to advance women's
24	rights and gender equality, a stated priority of

United States foreign policy and national security;
 and

3 (5) achieving equal access to and quality of
4 educational opportunity for girls contributes signifi5 cantly to economic growth and development, thereby
6 lowering the risk for violence and instability.

7 SEC. 4. SECONDARY EDUCATION FOR ADOLESCENT GIRLS.

8 (a) AUTHORITY.—The Administrator of the United 9 States Agency for International Development shall seek to 10 enter into agreements to support adolescent girls' access 11 to quality secondary education, particularly in countries 12 where adolescent girls are significantly more likely to drop 13 out of school than boys. Activities under such agreements 14 shall—

(1) be informed by a context-specific, evidencebased analysis of the challenges that girls face in
successfully transitioning to, remaining enrolled in,
and completing secondary school;

(2) improve safe, inclusive, and quality educational opportunities for girls and advance girls'
empowerment so that girls can successfully transition to, remain enrolled in, and complete secondary
school, achieve positive life and learning outcomes,
and make healthy transitions into adulthood; and

(3) seek to use United States Government
 strategies and frameworks relevant to international
 basic education, women's and girls' empowerment,
 and gender equality to integrate multi-sectoral, evi denced-based approaches to adolescent girls' edu cation and well-being.

7 (b) ACCEPTANCE OF SOLICITATIONS FOR AWARDS.—
8 The Administrator of the USAID shall seek to accept so9 licitations for awards, pursuant to the authority in sub10 section (a), to conduct activities carried out agreements
11 pursuant to subsection (a) beginning not later than 180
12 days after the date of the enactment of this Act.

(c) MONITORING AND EVALUATION.—The Administrator of the USAID shall seek to ensure that activities
carried out under agreements pursuant to subsection
(a)—

(1) employ rigorous monitoring and evaluation
methodologies to ensure that such activities demonstrably improve adolescent girls' access to secondary
education, close the gap in gender parity for secondary education, and improve the quality of girls'
education;

23 (2) disaggregate data collected and reported by24 age, gender, marital and motherhood status, dis-

ability, and geographic location, to the extent prac ticable and appropriate; and

3 (3) use, to the extent possible, indicators and
4 methodologies identified by the Interagency Working
5 Group for the Strategy on International Basic Edu6 cation.

7 (d) COORDINATION AND OVERSIGHT.—

8 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Administrator of the 9 United States Agency for International Develop-10 ment, in coordination with the USAID Coordinator 11 for International Basic Education Assistance, the 12 USAID Youth Coordinator, and the most senior 13 USAID and Department of State officials on ad-14 vancing women's rights and gender equality, shall be 15 responsible for the oversight and coordination of all activities of the United States Government carried 16 17 out under this section, as appropriate.

(2) DEVELOPMENT OF AGREEMENTS.—In the
development of agreements described in subsection
(a), the Administrator of the USAID, in coordination with the other officials described in paragraph
(1), shall consult with representatives across Federal
departments and agencies who are implementing the
global strategy described in section 5.

2	GIES.—Activities carried out under this section shall

12	SEC. 5. GLOBAL STRATEGY REQUIREMENT.
13	(a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 1 year after the
14	date of the enactment of this Act, the Administrator of
15	the USAID, in coordination with the USAID Coordinator
16	for International Basic Education Assistance, the USAID
17	Youth Coordinator, and the most senior USAID and De-
18	partment of State officials on advancing women's rights
19	and gender equality, shall—
20	(1) review and update a United States global
21	strategy to empower adolescent girls, which includes
22	a focus on girls' access to quality, inclusive sec-

	ondary education and subsequent agency implemen-

(2) submit the updated strategy to the appro priate congressional committees.

3 (b) 5-YEAR UPDATE OF STRATEGY.—Not later than 4 5 years after the date of the enactment of this Act, the 5 Administrator of the USAID, in coordination with the 6 other officials described in subsection (a), shall submit to 7 the appropriate congressional committees a further update 8 and revision of the strategy and implementation plans de-9 scribed in such subsection.

10 (c) CONSULTATION REQUIRED.—In reviewing and 11 updating the strategy and implementation plans described 12 in subsections (a), the Administrator of the United States 13 Agency for International Development, in coordination 14 with the other officials described in such subsection, shall 15 consult with and provide meaningful opportunity for re-16 view to—

- 17 (1) the heads of relevant Federal departments18 and agencies (or their designees);
- 19 (2) the appropriate congressional committees;20 and

(3) representatives of United States and international civil society and multilateral organizations
with demonstrated experience and expertise in empowering adolescent girls and promoting women's
empowerment and gender equality, including local

1 civil society organizations, faith-based organizations,

2 and, where possible, program participants.

3 SEC. 6. TRANSPARENCY AND REPORTING TO CONGRESS.

4 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 1 year after the
5 submission of the first strategy required by section 5, and
6 biennially thereafter for 4 years, the Administrator of the
7 USAID, in coordination with the Secretary of State, shall
8 submit to the appropriate congressional committees a re9 port describing—

10 (1) the activities initiated under agreements11 under the authorities provided by this Act; and

(2) the manner and extent to which such activities are monitored and evaluated, in accordance with
section 4(d).

(b) AVAILABILITY.—The reports required by subsection (a) shall be made available on a text-based, searchable, and publicly available website of the USAID.

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
